If you have recently changed your mobile or landline phone number then please let us know as a matter of urgency, otherwise you will not receive the messages we send out for your information.

WWI Centenary and Remembrance

On Friday 9th November 2018, the All Saints community came together to mark the WWI Armistice Centenary with a two minute silence and remembrance activity around the Armistice. This marked the end of the four year programme we have run over the course of the WWI Centenary, which included the five Remembrance days of the Centenary.



Remembrance Day and Monthly Prayers

For each Remembrance Day during the Centenary, All Saints have come together as a community to mark Armistice Day, before the students have completed a form time programme relating to WWI. The November programmes have covered the outbreak of the war; Harry Patch (the last British Tommy) and forgiveness; personal battles looking at PTSD and disabilities and how treatment and perceptions have changed since WWI; the Christmas Truce of 1914; the Armistice and post war attitudes.

We have also looked at WWI as part of the form prayers, with one session a month dedicated to WWI. We have covered songs and poems, battle, countries, and developments during and after the war, including the roles of women and animals, and some of the charities that developed in response to the war.



National Remembrance

We have linked some national initiatives into our Remembrance, including acquiring both a 'Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red' poppy from the Tower of London, and a 'There but Not There' Tommy, both of which are used in our November Remembrance Display.

Year 8 students created a wonderful display of poppies which was situated in Reception during remembrance and WW1 centenary events. From Monday 12th November the poppies are being sold in school for a minimum suggested donation of £1, which will be collected for the Royal British Legion fund. Well done year 8!
