We marked Stephen Lawrence day in April with an extended form time for Years 8 to 11. The focus was on the work of the Stephen Lawrence Foundation.


Students learnt about who Stephen was; born on 13th September 1974 in London, Stephen grew up to be an ordinary teenage boy who liked running and wanted to become an architect. On 22nd April 1993 he was killed in a random racist attack as he walked down the street with his friend. It took many years of campaigning to see the killers brought to justice and even a change to British law allowing people to be tried more than once for the same crime. There were many failings in the original investigation which led to an inquiry looking into racism and the ways it can be carried out.

Over the years many people including Stephen's mother have been campaigning to create a fairer society and for Stephen's death, to bring positive change. In 2018, on the 25th Anniversary of Stephen's death the Prime Minister announced a National Day in his honour.



She has very kindly donated it to school where it will reside in the chapel.








## **English**







#### COVID-19

#### When should someone self-isolate?

Self-isolation is when you do not leave your home because you have or might have coronavirus (COVID-19). Self-isolating helps stop the virus spreading to other people.



#### Self-isolate immediately if:

- You have any symptoms of coronavirus (a high temperature, a new continuous cough or a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste)
- You are waiting for the result of a COVID-19 test
- You've tested positive for coronavirus this means you have coronavirus
- You live with someone who has symptoms or tested positive
- Someone in your support bubble has symptoms or tested positive
- You're told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace or the NHC COVID-19 app
- You arrive in the UK from a country with a high coronavirus risk

#### When to get a test

Get a test as soon as possible if you have any symptoms of coronavirus (a high temperature, a new continuous cough or a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste.) You do not need to get a test if you have no symptoms or if you have different symptoms.

To ensure that we can keep in contact with families whilst they are self-isolating or contact parents urgently if a child becomes unwell during the day, it is vitally important that parent/carer contact details (telephone numbers, address etc) held by school are up-to-date. Please inform school immediately of any changes to these.

## Face Coverings

We have been really impressed with the majority of students acceptance and continued support by wearing face masks in school at designated times.

We would like to ask parents/carers to please continue to support us by ensuring students wear a face mask to school, and also ask that students keep a spare mask in their school bag should they ever need it. We ask that face coverings continue to be worn in half term 6 until the Local Authority guidance changes.
